What cultural characteristics contribute to lack of child safety in organizations?

- Cultures that do not support the open discussion of matters related to sex and child sexual abuse
- 2. Cultures that inhibit and undermine children's self-expression
- 3. Senior management cultures
- 4. Cultures that intensify the negative impact of power differentials
- 5. Cultures that intensify the negative impact of informal group dynamics
- 6. Cultures that undermine faithful compliance to good governance mechanisms designed to inhibit the perpetration, speed up detection, and enhance the response to child sexual abuse

What creates a child safe culture?

- Stakeholders and leaders of child/family service organizations introduce and provide organization-wide cultural content that is antithetical to the types of cultural content that facilitates child sexual abuse in institutional contexts.
 - a. Organization leadership sets the example in engaging in safety culture behavior; socialize its members to embrace safety culture; create policies and practices (such as mandatory training on child safe cultures) that operationalize safety culture behaviors.
- Stakeholders and leaders of child/family service organizations need to ensure that
 written, high-level policies and procedures, including efforts to articulate the underlying
 assumptions, values and beliefs, and norms that support adherence to such policies, are
 translated into effective implementation plans and become standard practice within the
 organizational context.
 - a. Literature on child safe organizations focuses on leader behavior and staff training as mechanisms for implementing child safe guidelines and practices.
 - b. Literature highlights the necessity of going beyond high-level polices and emphasizes the importance of using symbolic means to create a child safe culture.
- 3. Organizations that exhibit the characteristics of high-reliability organizations are robust and can stand up to severely adverse events, such as child sexual abuse. Characteristics of high reliability organizations include:
- 1. High reliability organizations are sensitive to operations.
- 2. High reliability organizations are reluctant to accept "simple" explanations for problems.
 - 3. High reliability organizations have a preoccupation with failure.

- 4. High reliability organizations defer to expertise.
- 5. High reliability organizations are resilient.

Organizations need the trainings necessary to become high reliability organizations.

4. Extensive involvement of lower-level staff is imperative in forming policies and procedures to prevent the perpetration, speed up the detection, and enhance the response to child sexual abuse. Lower-level staff need to be involved in the persistent scrutiny of instances where risks relating to child sexual abuse emerge, with the goal of continuous process improvement in preventing, detecting, and responding to abuse.

How to attain a child safe culture

The most effective means to create and attain a child safe culture is to provide annual mandatory training to leaders and lower-level staff in the prevention, detection, and response to and reporting of child sexual abuse. Training at the organization level related to reducing risk and creating a high reliability organization, including writing effective policies and procedures related to child sexual abuse handling is paramount to attaining a child safe culture

The role of child safety training in organizations

Training needs to consist of identifying and reporting child abuse, how to interact with child victims of sexual abuse, assessing risk and addressing risk reduction, writing and implementing effective policies and procedures, and interacting with law enforcement. Training needs to happen at a comprehensive organizational level.

Examples of child safe and organizational trainings:

The Child Abuse Prevention Center (Sacramento, CA)

The CAP Center provides training and technical assistance to build capacity within the field of child and family services, as well as to the community. Through interactive workshops, participants will improve their knowledge and skills to achieve positive outcomes for children and families.

Philosophy for training and technical assistance is based on three core principles:
